All about Hurunui


More people are choosing to call the Hurunui home. With its outstanding natural landscapes, welcoming communities and location just 40 minutes from Christchurch, we're not surprised!

The Hurunui District lies just 30 minutes north of Christchurch, the largest city in the South Island of New Zealand.

It begins at Leithfield Beach and extends to the Conway River south of the Kaikoura Peninsula. It is bordered on the west by the snowcapped peaks of the Southern Alps and on the east by the rich oceanic waters of the Pacific.

As the Hurunui is predominantly rural, with a population of 12,558 (2018 Census night population), it has a strong agricultural focus with sheep, beef and dairy farming being important.

Hurunui offers a great lifestyle, adventure and a chance to experience



the rich history and culture of rural New Zealand. Its small towns offer a window into the rural heartland.

Seasons vary dramatically, with hot summers and snowfalls in winter. Autumn temperatures are mild with stunning seasonal colours, while exotic flowers, green pastures and lambs dominate the spring landscape.

The towns of Amberley, Cheviot, Culverden and Hanmer Springs are the major urban areas. The district also has a number of villages and beach settlements.

In recent years, more and more people have chosen to move to the district to enjoy all the benefits of living in the country.

The iwi (Māori indigenous people) that hold mana whenua (customary authority) status in the Hurunui District are Te Rūnanga o Ngāi Tahu, Te Ngāi Tūāhuriri Rūnanga, and Te Rūnanga o Kaikōura.

Settling in...

Moving to a new place can be a challenging journey but, in the Hurunui, you will find friendly neighbours, colleagues and services ready to help you every step of the way.





The Hurunui District is considered a safe community in which to live, work and play. However, we still recommend that you take a few steps to keep yourself, your family and your belongings safe.

Don't give your full name, address, personal details, or bank account information to people you do not know or trust, especially over the phone or via email.

Consider getting insurance. Most people have car insurance, contents insurance and home insurance (if they have a property). Third party car insurance is essential if you have a car.

New Zealand is one of the least corrupt countries in the world, so you can safely trust our government and emergency services.

Getting around...

Before driving

You must have a driver's licence. You can use an international driver's licence or permit for up to 12 months, after which you will need to get a New Zealand driver's licence. The road rules are explained in the Road Code, which is available online at https://www.nzta.govt.nz/roadcode or you can buy one at most bookshops. Everyone in the car must wear a seatbelt and children under the age of seven must be in an approved child's car seat.

Education

Preschools (kindergartens, playcentres and childcare)

Children under the age of five years old can be enrolled at kindergartens, playcentres and childcare facilities. Between the ages of three and five, your child may be eligible for 20 hours per week of free childhood education. Talk to staff at your early childhood education centre to find out more.

Primary School

There are 10 primary schools (Year 1 through to Year 8) in Hurunui District. Children are legally required to begin primary school by age six.



Health services

Finding a General Practice (Doctor's Clinic)

For regular health and medical care, it's a good idea to register the whole family with a general practice. The doctor is also known as a general practitioner, or GP. Most general practices are part of a Primary Health Organisation (PHO), which allows patients to receive cheaper doctors' visits and reduced costs of prescription medicines.


You can ask your local general practice if they are part of a PHO. Children under the age of 14 years can visit the doctor for free.

Hospital

Hurunui doesn't have a hospital that provides outpatient and community health services. The nearest hospital is in Christchurch.



Paramedics

Amberley has a base for St John paramedics and also operates the North Canterbury Health Shuttle. Cheviot and Culverden have a volunteer St John Service as well.



ACC

The Accident Compensation Corporation (ACC) provides personal injury cover for all New Zealand citizens, residents and temporary visitors to New Zealand. This means that if you have an accident or injure yourself, the cost of visiting a doctor may be partially covered by the government.

Dental Health

Dental care is free for people under 18 years of age. If you are over 18 years of age, you will need to pay for dental care. The closest dentists are located in Rangiora or Kaiapoi.

Community Services Card

People or families on low or moderate incomes, and who are permanent legal residents of New Zealand, may qualify for a Community Services Card, which makes visits to a doctor cheaper. www.workandincome.govt.nz

Emergencies

For life-threatening health emergencies, free phone 111 for an ambulance. For non-life threatening or after-hours health situations, phone your local General Practice or you can phone Healthline on 0800 611 116 to speak to a registered nurse.

Working here

There are a number of different employment industries in the Hurunui District, from farming and manufacturing, to accommodation, food services and tourism.





Gore Bay

In the Hurunui District lies a little-known gem: The Gore Bay Tourist Drive, which directs our visitors to the coastal settlement of Gore Bay.

It's 21 kilometres in length, with your starting point at either Domett if heading north (turn to your right and take Hurunui Mouth Road), or Cheviot if heading south (turn to your left, just after Hammer Hardware). Look for the brown tourist road signs.

Gore Bay is considered one of New Zealand's safest surfing beaches and offers a large range of summer houses (also known as cribs or baches) for hire.
